WHAT IS SEXTORTION?

> Extorting money by threatening to publicly share or post evidence of a person's sexual activity; typically intimate images or videos of the victim.



According to cybertip.ca, there was a 56% increase in youth sextortion cases from March-August 2022. Cybertip.ca receives around 200 reports per month.





HOW IT HAPPENS

Scammers make fake accounts/profiles and then troll social media looking for victims. Scammers may even use voice and image-modifying tech to appear like legitimate willing intimate partners.



You send intimate images/videos or participate in video streaming. Afterwards you receive a threatening message demanding money otherwise the scammer will post and share the images/video.







If you are being threatened, make sure to keep all evidence you can and block the account. Paying the scammer most often results in further demands and escalated threats. Talk to a trusted adult, local Victim Support service, or the police. Sextortion is a crime and there are resources available to help victims.
